1) Metropolitan Medical Response System Bio-terrorism Preparedness Grant	1) Funds from this grant will go toward equipment for County Fire HazMat.
2) 2005/2006 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	2) Received written notification that grant applications for stations that need air bags and/or air chisels, and a generator for Poppet Flats submitted to the 1 st , 3 rd , 4 th and 5 th Districts were deemed eligible. The grant application submitted to the 2 nd District was deemed ineligible. RCOFD has been invited to attend a Public Hearing on March 22, 2005 to give a brief presentation on behalf of the grant applications. This will help the Board of Supervisors determine funding priorities.
3) 2004/2005 VFA Supplemental	3) Received verbal notification that our request will be approved for a Vega Viper Interoperability C-Soft consoles and SCBA gear for the following twelve (12) rural fire stations: Cottonwood #52, Poppet Flats #63, Pine Cove #23, Anza #29, Sage #28, Pinyon #30, Gardner Valley #53, Lake Riverside #77, El Cariso #51, Rancho Carrillo #62, Rancho Capistrano #74, and Lakeland Village #11.

This is the first year of funding for this competitive grant that provides up to a maximum of \$100,000 per fire fighter with an increasing grant match requirement from 10, 20, 50, 70% over the four-year period to phase down local government dependence on the federal government. The web-based application will be available from May 31 through June 28, 2005.</p> <p>2) The first identified funding source is not available. However, the hoist was also included in the Indian Gaming grant as a backup-funding source.</p> <p>3) In the process of researching grant funding availability for Blythe Battalion. Net result – 99% of County Fire paid personnel are trained at the EMT level or higher. 88 volunteer firefighters completed the course. \$238,872 in EMS equipment and supplies was purchased to replace worn training equipment and update training aids for classes. The new equipment and supplies allowed County Fire to build three EMS training caches so that EMS classes may be taught simultaneously at multiple locations throughout Riverside County.</p> <p>3) The County of Riverside Bio Terrorism and Preparedness Branch conducted an</p>
