1) Metropolitan Medical Response System Bio-terrorism Preparedness Grant	1) Funds from this grant will go toward equipment for County Fire HazMat. Equipment to be distributed in July 2005.
2) 2005/2006 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	2) Chief Anthony presented on behalf of the grant applications at the Public Hearing on March 22, 2005. Should receive notification in two to four weeks.
3) Indian Gaming Local Community Benefit Committee (CBC)	3) Grant award announcement will be made at the June 27, 2005 CBC meeting in Banning. Requested the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Convert nine (9) existing staffing and engines in casino areas (Stations #20, 24, 25, 26, 35, 36, 72, 81, and 89) to emergency medical/paramedic units that provide basic and advanced life support (paramedic) and transport, automatic external defibrillators, and specialized heavy and helicopter rescue. ✓ Staff and equip heavy rescue engines for stations 24, 25, and 35 ✓ Secure partial funding and staff for new Station #77
4) SAFER Grant	4) In the process of preparing the Form 11 and a SAFER application for new Firefighter II positions for Stations: Nuview, Quail Valley, Pinyon, Garner Valley, and Sky Valley (unincorporated areas); and Canyon Lake and Calimesa (contract cities) to help bring them to 3-0 staffing. County Fire Chief is securing Calimesa interest and matching fund support. Canyon Lake is on board and will pursue Board support. Application deadline is June 28, 2005.
5) 2005 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program	5) Board approved Form 11 (April 12, 2005 Board Agenda) requesting Board authorization to apply for \$937,200 in grant funding to purchase turnout gear.
6) 2005 Hazardous Materials Emergency Planning (HMEP) Grant	6) Executive Team has approved submission of a HMEP grant application. HMEP planning funds may be used for the development, improvement, and implementation of emergency plans required under the EPCRA, as well as

The NOI was determined eligible and County Fire will be allowed to submit an application. There is a 75/25-match requirement for this project. Executive Team has approved submission of this grant application. The CWPP has been funded through the ESRI contract. Will explore the use of the FEMA DR-1577 funds for the Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan and attend workshop on June 21/22, 2005 in San Bernardino.</p> <p><u>STATUS</u></p> <p>1) The first identified funding source is not available. Hoist was also included in the Indian Gaming grant.</p> <p>2) In the process of researching grant funding availability for Blythe Battalion. They requested funding for a "four gas monitor."</p> <p>3) Exploring the possibility of securing grant funding from this source to help fund and fund specific training to meet HazMat's Federal and State certification requirements.</p> <p>4) Grant is provided through the Public Safety Foundation of America. The focus of the grant is to fund the implementation of enhanced 911, or wireless 911 technologies, including planning and coordination, equipment and technology upgrades. To assist in deploying this technology in emergency dispatch centers.</p>

Requesting \$500,000 in funding to offset the cost of the total project
11) Crash Rescue Vehicles	9) 05 Fire Prevention and Firefighter Safety grant applications will be accepted in September 2005. Requesting internal grant recommendations (will include Chief Hutchinson and Chief Bennett’s request for fire prevention/disaster preparedness educational trailers.
12) Community Development Block Grant	10) AED Superstore, the world’s largest source of automated defibrillators (AEDs), is underwriting and administering a private grant to provide 12 Defibtech Lifeline AEDs to twelve U.S. fire service agencies over the course of one year. One AED will be awarded each month. Interested agencies are invited to apply at http://www.aedsforlife.org . The grant period starts April 5, 2005 and ends March 31, 2006. All municipal, county, state, and federal fire agencies are eligible to apply. This includes volunteer, paid-on-call, career and combination fire departments. Private or “for profit” fire agencies are not eligible. Awards will consist of one Defibtech Lifeline AED with one pair of adult electrode pads, a 5-
